Spring Cleanup!

•The ECHOA **Annual Meeting** was held March 26 at 6pm. Due to Covid-19 virus-related municipal & state meeting restrictions, the meeting was conducted electronically. There was a very good turnout but, due to high demand on network grids, individuals experienced some technical difficulties. The Board President welcomed the group & gave a recap of the year & the operating budget for 2020 was successfully approved. Scott Breitsprecher, Jim Hendley, Jo Gottschalk, & William Bergeron, Jr. continue to serve as your ECHOA Board of Directors (along with Cedric Burden, Property Mgr. & non-voting member).

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•**Spring cleanup**: Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) crews have begun their annual spring cleaning of local roads. The street sweepers are out cleaning up the loose dirt/gravel to minimize dust that effects air quality. The MOA spring cleanup is being held on May 4-31 this year. You can help! Get out & help pick-up & clean-up our area if you can. Note: due to the Covid-19 emergency, the MOA announced a free summer disposal pass at the Anchorage Landfill, in lieu of the yearly free dump dates. (See calendar for dates, more info.)



•Bears and Moose: Bears and moose are out & about. Bears are being seen out & about in Anchorage and Eagle River. Folks have shared several videos of black bears wandering this week near Eagle Crossing. When walking, be safe & be aware of your surroundings. Also, keep the garbage & waste stored; it attracts bears.



•**Dog, Cat Etiquette**: Every day, residents get out to enjoy the weather, get some exercise, & walk their dogs. Our beautiful area is perfect for it! Please help us keep our area clean, sanitary, & be respectful of property. Keep residents & your pets safe, too.

- 1. Pack baggies to "**scoop up the poop**!" Pick up the poop in your yard—front & back; pick it up when you walk your pooch & pack it out. It takes seconds, is sanitary, helps prevent disease, keeps your puppy's feet clean, keeps our homes & common areas beautiful & clean, & protects our water quality. PLEASE don't let your pooch poop on someone else's yard. If your canine guy or gal can't wait, just pick it up immediately & dispose of it properly.
- 2. The Municipality of Anchorage (MOA), including the Eagle River area, requires animals to have current **licenses**, be up-to-date on **shots**, & to be **on leash** &/or properly & safely restrained on your property. (see MOA regulations, restrictions). Loose dogs—even the most docile & friendly—may attack or severely injure other animals &/or people. Fyi, the Eagle Crossing Homeowner's Association (ECHOA) Covenants limit homeowners to possession of 2 animals (w/ few exceptions).
- 3. Cats kill large numbers of birds & other small animals every year & regularly get run over, lost, become victims to loose dogs or wild animals (for ex., scooped up as food by eagles in our area). They are more susceptible to disease & parasites & animal cruelty (unfortunately true). (See American Humane Assoc. for more info.) Please **keep your felines safe in home.** Consider using halters to walk them; there are many types available & it works! They get to enjoy the time out with you.

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- Walk-Through: The annual, spring Walk-Through is scheduled for on/around June 2. Board members generally perform this walk with the Property Manager bi-annually—this year, individually or a safe 6' distance from one another—to report on common areas & note general maintenance or other property issues. (Examples: Yards watered/mowed. Garbage cans & other items stored out-of-sight. Items not stacked up, laying on lawns or stored in the open or on common areas &/or sidewalks or paths. Homes painted, repaired. Roof, steps, porches in good order. Sign corners & medians in good condition. Pathways or common areas clean, clear, etc.) Keeping a clean, tidy, & attractive home & association helps keep everyone's property values up & increases the desirability of our neighborhoods, in general. You & your tenants are an important part of this effort.
- **Winter to Spring**: Reminder—Winter items must be stored, put away by **May 1**. Motorhomes, campers, & boats can be moved onto our driveways for summer. Note: You cannot park vehicles of any kind for long periods of time on the streets. Call the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA), not the ECHOA, to report these & MOA staff will then ticket & tow them away. (See MOA for regulations governing parked cars.) Studded tires must be removed by May 11 this year, per Gov.Dunleavy (normally, May 1 is the deadline for the Anchorage area).
- Common Area, Fires: Green common areas within the ECHOA, surrounding our homes, are managed by the ECHOA. We have all noticed some aging & dry, dead trees & underbrush on some of those sections. Fire danger is a serious concern. It was very dry &, at times, smoky here last summer due to surrounding area fires. If you are interested in volunteering for limited fire hazard prevention immediately adjacent to your home on common area property, please contact Cedric Burden, Property Manager to gain Board approval—before acting to clear or cut. (No burning is allowed.) Likewise, if your property borders the Church of Latter Day Saints, the Alpenglow elementary school, MOA land, or another's property, you must first seek their approval before clearing adjacent to or on their land. The safety & security of all residents & their homes is everyone's responsibility.

Fires, Fireworks: The Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) regularly issues changing guidelines on fires & the legality of personal fireworks. The ECHOA also has covenant rules about open fires within the association. Check before burning anything anywhere. Ask if you have a question. Again, safety is what we all care about.

If you see a fire, smoke, or anything dangerous, immediately call 911.

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•Home-of-the-Month awards: Still popular, the Board votes on & awards four \$50 Lowe's gift certificates each year—one each in June, July, October, & December. This nice thank-you award recognizes outstanding efforts with lawns, flowers, landscaping &/or seasonal decorations. Voting usually takes place the third week of each of the award months. If the resident allows, we publish their address & a picture in the newletter. (Note: There are so many beautiful homes & so many deserve the recognition, it is hard to choose just one. We think some neighbors deserve to win all the time but a resident may win only one time per year.)

We hope you will consider environmentally safe & friendly gardening practices, too (protecting our important, struggling yet critical species like bees, birds, butterflies, etc. & avoiding use of pesticides, herbicides, limiting fertilizers & planting indigenous plant species as healthy food sources for those critters. (For more info., see nwf.org & others).
